Welcome to the Gettysburg College–Gilder Lehrman MA in American History Fall 2024 Newsletter. We are pleased to be celebrating the third year of our partnership with Gettysburg College. This fall, we expanded our offerings with three new courses taught by Professor Evelyn Brooks Higginbotham of Harvard University, Professor Michael Birkner of Gettysburg College, and Professor Denver Brunsman of George Washington University. We also saw our highest number yet of fall enrollments, with 867 students enrolling in eight courses, and three more teachers in the program earned the Dev Chodry Scholarship.

2023-2024 COMMENCEMENT



On July 10, we celebrated 178 graduates at the Majestic Theater in Gettysburg. Elliott West, Bancroft Prize winner, Pulitzer Prize finalist, and lead professor in the program, delivered the commencement address. Gettysburg College Provost Jamila Bookwala also shared words of wisdom for the graduates before welcoming each graduate onstage to receive a Stole of Gratitude. With this tradition, graduates became part of the 32,000-strong Gettysburg alumni community.

ALUMNI SPOTLIGHT: FAITH STACKHOUSE DALY

This fall, Faith Stackhouse Daly '22 achieved a goal years in the making and began a fully funded PhD program at the University of California, Berkeley. It was the Gettysburg College–Gilder Lehrman MA program that provided an entry back into academia for Faith, whose plans had been disrupted in her senior year of college by a severe concussion that forced her to take a break from her studies. She spent a few years working as a treaty analyst on the Chemical Weapons Convention before she found teaching.



Returning to graduate school for history was not an option early on because of the financial burden it posed, so Faith pursued her passion for teaching by becoming a high school teacher. She initially planned to go back to graduate school after five years of teaching, but it was not until twenty years later that she began the Gettysburg College–Gilder Lehrman MA Program, opening the door again to receiving the PhD she'd always wanted. "In the process of trying to convince myself that completing the MA would be enough for me and that I could teach high school until retirement," Faith said, "my family and I realized that I was so much happier when conducting historical research, that pursuing a PhD became the only natural path forward."

Faith credits section professors Jennifer Seman and Laura Ping with helping sharpen her research and writing skills. Equally influential was the opportunity to learn from the MA program's renowned lead professors. In her PhD program at UC Berkeley, Faith will be building on the research she began for her MA thesis, which focused on winery women who fought against Prohibition in Northern California. "I'm focusing on women in the West in the Gilded Age and Progressive Era, particularly women who are frequently treated as the 'other,'" Faith shares. Her dissertation will also engage with gender, protests, borderlands, immigration, and economic histories.

"I sincerely believe that I would not be entering UC Berkeley in the fall without my work and the relationships I built through GLI."

New Course Spotlights

US Political History Since 1945 with Beverly Gage | Yale University

This course will cover United States politics, political thought, and social movements since 1945. It will incorporate pivotal elections and political figures (Truman, Nixon, Reagan) as well as politics from below (civil rights, labor, women's activism).

American Art History and Material Culture of the 18th and 19th Centuries with Jennifer Van Horn | University of Delaware

This course investigates the creation, display, and reception of art and material culture in the United States from roughly 1650 to 1900. We will ask how paintings, sculptures, buildings, and artifacts of various media represented and shaped notions of "America" and American identities.

Since my degree, I have been asked to teach the pilot program of AP African American Studies at Waukegan High School, and I am currently in the beginning stages of setting up a Dual Credit Class in American History for all of our students who wish to receive college credit before leaving. Last year, our students who took the AP exam in African American Studies achieved a

success rate of 83% where students received a grade of 3 or higher on the AP Test. It was one of the most successful AP classes at Waukegan High School and has provided students with the possibility to obtain college credit as they continue their education.

The GLI MA program allowed me to do this while I was working. I am now allowed to teach college credit courses at my school. This is the first time we have ever offered a college course in history at Cascade High School.

In December 2023, I published a book on Amazon based on many of my GLI course papers. Its title is *Across the Kentucky Color Line: Cultural Landscapes of Race from the Lost Cause to Integration.* I am working on a second book, *Deep Green River's Lonely Vale: Slavery and Civil War in Western Kentucky.* It will be published in 2025.

Barbara Silberman Forbes House Museum Milton, Massachusetts

This summer, I presented at History Camp in Boston, an annual event for adults. My session was titled, "Opium: The Business of Addiction." The presentation was based on an exhibition I developed for the Forbes House Museum in Milton, MA that won an award from the New England Museum Association and the American Association for State and Local History. The exhibition detailed the relationship between the Forbes family and the opium trade, linking it to the current opioid epidemic and our current relations with China.



James McKay National Park Service (Retired) New York

An essay I wrote with my wife, historian Patricia West, author of the book *Domesticating History: The Political Origins of America's House Museums*, has been included in the recently published collection *Interpreting Christmas at Museums and Historic Sites*. The essay, entitled "The Ghost of Christmas That Never Was" presents strategies for historic site interpreters to use to create historically

meaningful holiday events at the numerous historic sites which actually have no documented evidence of Christmas celebrations. The book was published by Rowman and Littlefield as part of the American Association of State and Local History (AASLH) Interpreting History series of guides for history practitioners to enlarge their breadth of interpretation of American history.



Hank Deslaurier Galveston College Galveston, Texas

I am now teaching as a full-time community college professor at Galveston College, where I am also the program coordinator of the History and Government departments. I have recently been added to the Houston Heritage Society Board of Directors and I am a featured speaker for Galveston's University of Texas Medical Branch Osher Lifelong Learning Institute.

Katherine Corrado Woodgrove High School Purcellville, Virginia

I was invited to attend the **Congressional Gold Medal** Ceremony for Rosie the Riveter last April. I completed my master's thesis on real-life Rosies toward the end of Covid in August of 2021, and thus interviewed several of them via Zoom. I have been volunteering for the National Memorial to the Women Who Worked on the Homefront Foundation to build a monument in DC honoring Rosie the Riveters. It was one of the highlights of my career to meet 30 Rosies that lived to see their recognition in the form of the highest civilian honor.









I recently published my first book, *Marquis de Lafayette Returns*, and have been on a book tour in celebration of the bicentennial of Lafayette's 1824–1825 National Tour. I have been invited to give Lafayette walking tours for the city of Alexandria, Virginia and have spoken at the American Revolution Institute of the Society of the Cincinnati, George Washington's Mount Vernon, Arlington House, and the White House Historical Association to name a few. My association with the Gettysburg–GLI program has opened doors for me that I never thought possible!
